Impact Measurement

Track & measure the impact of our work & the work of members, partners, & local/state policymakers.

Membership

Develop & deliver member benefits & services that support or enhance the sector.



Partnership

Establish quality relationships with other people & organizations to support member capacity building.



Movement Building

Create holistic change to advance economic justice, equity, & wholeness for neighborhoods & communities.



Determine policy priorities & develop advocacy strategies to mobilize a broad constituency of allies.



Association-to-Association Networking

Maintain relationships & collaborate with fellow community development associations.



Use research & analysis to understand the environment & inform policy agendas & innovative practices.



Communications

Convey information through effective, innovative, & alternative avenues to advance mission & policy agenda.



Org Leadership

Staff & board are accountable & use defined governance practices, strategic planning, & participatory decision-making.

Internal Management

Manage the org to both support staff & volunteers who carry out the work & to reassure outsiders of solvency & stability.
